

Spring Membership Meeting The Daughters of Yalta

On Thursday, April 15, at 6 p.m., historian Catherine Grace Katz will present a virtual lecture on her book, *The Daughters of Yalta* – *The Churchills, Roosevelts, and Harrimans:* A Story of Love and War. This is the untold story of the three young women who accompanied their famous fathers to the Yalta Conference in Crimea in February 1945, when the Allied leaders—Winston Churchill, Franklin Roosevelt, and Joseph Stalin — met to shape the future world order in the closing months of World War II.



Katz's research on the topic began with her

interest in the life of Sarah Churchill. An actress-turned-RAF officer, Sarah was devoted to her brilliant father who appreciated her astute political mind. She also made her mark on Coastal Georgia history with her impromptu wedding to British photographer Anthony Beauchamp at the Sea Island home of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred W. Jones, Sr. in 1949.

Also featured are Kathleen Harriman and Anna Roosevelt. Harriman was a champion skier, war correspondent, and daughter of U.S. Ambassador to the Soviet Union Averell Harriman. Roosevelt's only daughter, Anna, was chosen instead of her mother Eleanor to accompany the president to Yalta. She had become her father's most trusted confidante during his third term in office, as his health declined.

The Daughters of Yalta examines the complex relationships between these fathers and daughters against the backdrop of tense negotiations to secure world peace.

Launch of the Georgia World War II Heritage Trail

After the opening of the new World War II Home Front Museum in December 2018, the Society's Executive Director Sherri Jones teamed up with Scott Loehr, President of the Mighty Eighth Museum in Savannah to reach out to WWII sites across the state. The resulting *Georgia World War II Heritage Trail* launched on February 16, and includes ten sites who have partnered to make Georgia's rich WWII heritage more accessible to visitors, families, and groups.

Trail visitors can take flight in a WWII airplane, build a Liberty ship, explore a pilot training base, march in the boots of the Band of Brothers, and learn the personal stories of courage, character, and patriotism displayed by the men and women involved. Suggested routes for North Georgia, Middle Georgia, and the Coast make it easy for visitors


to experience two or three locations over a weekend. A Trail "passport" has been created so visitors can track their progress along the route, debrief their visit, and receive a confirmation stamp with the "V for Victory!" Visit www.georgiawwiitrail.org for more information.

The Heritage Trail is one of only four WWII Trails in the nation, and will be promoted domestically and internationally by *Explore Georgia*, the tourism division of the Georgia Department of Economic Development. Georgia residents and leisure visitors can experience the collection as a way to learn more about the state's involvement in the war, both at home and abroad. Scott McQuade, President of the Golden Isles Convention and Visitors Bureau said, "I'm excited to support a new experience that will appeal to visitors seeking drive destinations and meaningful travel."



Virtual Book Talk: Lighthouses of the Georgia Coast

On Thursday, May 6, at 6 p.m., author William Rawlings will present a virtual program about his book *Lighthouses of the Georgia Coast*, due to be released in April by Mercer University Press. The Society is thrilled that the St. Simons Lighthouse is on the cover.



Rawlings' richly illustrated book devotes a chapter to each of Georgia's five lighthouses, exploring their unique styles and stories. "These magnificent structures continue to fascinate us, not only for their intrinsic beauty, but also as monuments of our shared history," notes the author. "From the mid-eighteenth through the early twentieth centuries, they were an integral part of the state's economy, vital to trade in cotton, rice, timber, naval stores, and other products shipped to ports in America and around the world." The book also includes information about lighthouse design and construction, the role and legacy of the keepers, and the strategic importance of the structures during the Civil War.

A prolific writer of "Southern stories," Rawlings is the author of eleven books, both fiction and nonfiction. He is a lifelong resident of Sandersville, Georgia, home to his family for more than two centuries. Now retired from his

practice in internal medicine, he was educated at Emory, Tulane, and Johns Hopkins Universities. *Lighthouses of the Georgia Coast* is his fifth work of nonfiction.

Annual Meeting Review

On Thursday, January 21, Elijah Heyward III, Ph.D., presented a virtual program entitled A Preview of Charleston's International African American Museum. The International African American Museum (IAAM) will open in Charleston, South Carolina in early 2022, with the mission to "honor the untold stories of the African American journey at one of our country's most sacred sites," the former Gadsden Wharf. entry point for over 150,000 enslaved Africans.

Dr. Heyward discussed the development and design of the museum, which will incorporate exhibit spaces, a family history center, and a memorial garden. State-of-the-art interactive technology will be used, along with traditional techniques, to tell the stories of the African diaspora and the spread of African culture and influence. Over 200 members and guests were in attendance. The program video and 2020 Annual Report are available for viewing on the Society's website.

Preservation Projects

January was a busy month for preservation projects at our Lighthouse Museum! At the Keeper's Dwelling, the shutters were painted and the rusty hinges were replaced with custom-made brass hinges. On the interior, areas of blistered and peeling paint on walls, ceilings, and woodwork throughout the building were repaired and painted, and the wood floors were cleaned and waxed. This work was funded by a generous donation from Janis and Cesar Rodriguez.

The masonry tower of the Lighthouse was carefully washed and, in several areas, painted to remove dirt, mold, and rust stains. All areas of rust on the main gallery at the top of the Lighthouse were removed and the entire gallery was repainted, as were areas of the lens room gallery. The five windows on the tower were also painted. This work addressed the areas of concern outlined in a structural assessment completed in October 2020. The project was supported by the Lighthouse Museum Preservation Fund, established in 2014 to protect our treasured buildings.



Collaboration with Local Educators





During February and March, the Society partnered with other educational institutions to present two lectures by Hank Klibanoff, Pulitzer Prize-winning author and former speaker at our Chautauqua Lecture Series. On February 17, the College of Coastal Georgia's Office of Diversity Initiatives hosted an in-person and virtual program

planned jointly by Society staff and Quinton Staples, CCGA Director of Diversity Initiates.

On March 12, students at Glynn Academy participated in a similar

virtual presentation and interactive session. Both lectures featured Klibanoff's most recent research into the historical context surrounding the death of Ahmaud Arbery in Glynn County, as well as his work on Civil Rights cold cases. Klibanoff's podcast about these projects is called "Buried Truths" and is available on most audio platforms.
