Returning this year is the Society's signature series that explores a topic through both a lecture and a field trip. Journeys 2022 will feature the history of the Jekyll Island Club through people and places.

On Thursday, April 7 at 6 p.m., independent curator and historian Jeannine Falino will set the scene with her lecture

Residences from Tuxedo Park to Jekyll Island. The program will examine the various places where people of wealth, such as the Jekyll Island Club members, escaped for recreation. Along with images of vacation homes built by the Gilded Age elite, Falino will present examples of the attire and decorative arts of the period.

Falino's projects have explored virtually every age of American art, from the colonial era onward. A former curator of American decorative arts at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, she has produced scholarly publications and curated exhibitions on American silver, jewelry, and the Gilded Age. She was co-curator for Gilded New York: Design, Fashion & Society (Museum of the City of New York, 2013) and author of The Newport Experience: Sustaining Historic Preservation into the 21st Century.

On Wednesday, April 20, our journey continues with a field trip to Jekyll Island's historic district. The morning will begin with a tour of Hollybourne Cottage led by Taylor Davis, Jekyll Island Historic Preservationist. The cottage was built in 1891 for Charles Stewart Maurice, a prominent bridge builder from Pennsylvania. The building is Jekyll's preservation work-in-progress, giving an excellent example of the meticulous research and craftsmanship that goes into preserving the historic structures of the Club.

Jekyll Island Museum's expert tour guides will provide commentary and transportation via trolley throughout the historic district during the day's activities. A seated lunch will be provided at the Jekyll Island Club Hotel.

In the afternoon, our tour will take us to Jekyll Island's new museum space, Mosaic. The education staff of the Jekyll Island Museum will provide insight into the lives and working experiences of staff members at the Club. Information on the celebration of the 75th Anniversary of state ownership of the island will be included. There will also be time for self-guided exploration of Mosaic.

Registration is required for both programs. Please visit coastalgeorgiahistory.org to register.

The **April 7 lecture** will be held in-person at 6 p.m. at the St. Simons Presbyterian Church and will also be available virtually. The lecture is free for members, and \$10 for non-members.

The **April 20 field trip** to Jekyll Island is \$60 per person. The trip includes admission to Jekyll's museum sites, a plated lunch, and trolley transportation around Jekyll Island. **Transportation to Jekyll Island will not be included**, but will be the responsibility of the trip attendee. The tour will begin at 10 a.m. and will conclude at approximately 4 p.m.

Spring Lecture:

The British are Coming: Early Years of the American Revolution

On **Thursday, May 5 at 5 p.m.**, author and journalist **Rick Atkinson** will present a lecture on his most recent book, **The British Are Coming: The War for America, Lexington to Princeton, 1775-1777**, the first volume of a trilogy on the American Revolution.

Winner of Pulitzer Prizes in both history and journalism, Atkinson is the bestselling author of the Liberation Trilogy, a narrative history of World War II in Europe. During two decades at The Washington Post, he worked as a reporter, foreign correspondent, and senior editor, and served as the Post's Berlin bureau chief.

The program will be held at The Cloister on Sea Island and will also be available via livestream. Society members attend free of charge. The cost for non-members is \$25. To register, visit coastalgeorgiahistory.org.

At a recent meeting, the Board of Directors reviewed progress against the CGHS Strategic Plan 2020-2025 since we are approaching the midpoint of the planning period. These are great questions for the industry—and critical questions for us to ask ourselves. We have a lot to do in the coming year and are deeply committed to answering these questions for our organization.


A Thank You!

After taking a year off due to COVID-19, Oglethorpe Point Elementary School hosted their History Day program on Friday, February 11.
