
Winter Program African/American: Making the Nation's Table Jessica Harris, Ph.D.

On Sunday, January 29, at 3 p.m., noted historian Jessica B. Harris, Ph.D., will present the Society's winter program, "African/ American: Making the Nation's Table." The program is inspired by an exhibit developed by the Museum of Food and Drink and shown at the Africa Center in New York City in 2022. Dr. Harris served as lead curator for the exhibit. which explored the influence of African foods

on American cuisine. She is recognized as the world's foremost expert on African and African American cuisine and has written twelve critically acclaimed books documenting the foodways of the African Diaspora. Her bestselling book *High on the Hog* was the basis of a 2021 Netflix docuseries of the same name, which features Dr. Harris. Her lecture will include information about how

Coastal Georgia traditions and agriculture have affected regional cuisine through the decades.

A professor in the English Department at Queens College, City University of New York,for 50 years until her retirement, Dr. Harris holds an A.B. from Bryn Mawr College, an M.A. in French Literature from Queens College, a License ès Lettres from the Université de Nancy, France, and a doctorate in Performance Studies from New York University. Her articles have appeared in most of the major food magazines including *Gourmet, Saveur, Food & Wine,* and *Southern Living*. She was inducted into the James Beard Foundation Cookbook Hall of Fame in 2019 and received the Foundation's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2020. As a consultant for the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, D.C., she conceptualized and curated the museum's acclaimed cafeteria.

The lecture will be held at the St. Simons Presbyterian Church at 3 p.m. The lecture is free of charge, but registration is required by visiting coastalgeorgiahistory.org.



Film Screening: The Soul of St. Simons Island, Georgia

Join us in February for a special screening of a short film produced and directed by acclaimed jazz musician Willie Ruff. With support from a National Endowment for the Arts grant, Willie Ruff, Dwike Mitchell, and virtuoso trumpeter Dizzy Gillespie traveled to the Sea Islands of Georgia in 1981 to meet legendary singer Bessie Jones. As Ruff said later, they visited Jones because she represented an experience that was "as far back as we could get where there was a traceable continuity. Her grandfather had been a slave child when he arrived in North America at

seven years old, and he brought not only memory of some games he had learned as a small child in Africa, but they kept learning more. She was just full of stories and riddles and dances and musical ring games." The film features conversations between Jones and Gillespie, and Jones and her students teaching Gillespie how to play several games. After revisiting the footage in 2015, Ruff completed an edit of the film, which was shown in 2020 at Yale University. This will be followed by a showing of Ruff's 1973 film *Tony Williams in Africa*, featuring jazz drummer Williams playing with Senegalese musicians and their "talking drums." In this trip to Africa, Ruff and Williams explored the connections between African music traditions and American jazz.

Willie Ruff, after earning his bachelor's and master's in music at Yale University, formed a duo with pianist Dwike Mitchell in the 1950s. With Ruff playing the French horn and double bass, the pair worked the nightclub and concert circuits, often as the opening attraction for legends such as Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, and Miles Davis. Ruff returned to his alma mater in 1971 and served on the faculty of the Yale School of Music until 2017. During these years, Ruff made a number of films focusing on the history of jazz and African American musical traditions.

Preservation Campaign: We are halfway to our goal of \$1.25 million!

Following a memorable celebration of the 150th birthday of the St. Simons Lighthouse in September, the Society launched a Campaign to raise \$1.25 million for the preservation of the Lighthouse and Keeper's Dwelling and the historic buildings that comprise the World War II Home Front Museum. By now, you will have received a letter and brochure with details about this vital initiative which will safeguard these important sites for future generations to enjoy. Led by generous support from the Board of Directors and the campaign co-chairs, the Donohue and Glasebrook families, we are excited to report that response to date totals \$642,000, over half of the campaign goal!



As a reminder of the critical nature of this effort, please take a moment to recall the appearance of the Historic Coast Guard Station when the Society assumed responsibility for the buildings in 2004. The photograph here illustrates the poor condition of the building and grounds, and the lack of ADA access. In addition to being unsightly and at risk of loss of the original fabric of the building, there was no interpretation for visitors of Coastal Georgia's rich wartime history. Today, as the restored and redesigned World War II Home Front Museum shown in the photograph below, the

site reflects the priority that we place on historic preservation and stands as a unique landmark of Coastal Georgia.

Buddy Sullivan's Local History Course

Buddy Sullivan will present a four-week lecture series, "History of the Golden Isles—and Slightly Beyond," on Tuesday afternoons, January 17, 24, 31, and February 7, from 4 – 5:30 p.m. at the A.W. Jones Heritage Center. The winter series will feature St. Simons, Sea Island, Jekyll, Sapelo, Brunswick, and Darien. The cost is \$50 for CGHS members and \$95 for non-members.



New Exhibit in the Heritage Center



An exhibit titled *Stories of the Georgia Coast: Its People and Places* has been installed in the lobby of the Heritage Center. Through interpretive panels, 11 coastal stories are presented, which offer a look at individuals and sites that have shaped the history of the coastal region. The goal of the

exhibit committee was to select significant and diverse topics that are not included in the interpretation of the Lighthouse Museum or the Home Front Museum. Examples of topics include Susie King Taylor, the nurse and teacher who started a school at the contraband camp on St. Simons during the Civil War, and Georgia architect Alfred Eichberg, who designed Old City Hall and other buildings in Brunswick. We invite you to stop by and view the exhibit, which is accompanied by a reference map of the Georgia coast.

The exhibit is part of this year's project to refresh the public areas of the Heritage Center for the enjoyment of our members, visitors, and those who hold events in the building.



Online Collection Expands



Since the Society launched an online collections catalog in November 2021, new items have been added to our digital database of archival photographs, documents, and objects. Visit our website to learn about interesting events that took place in Glynn County such as the one depicted in this image from the silent movie *The Wrecker*. The Society holds a collection of photographs showing scenes from the early movie, which was produced in Brunswick in 1916. Filmmaker Richard E. Norman of Jacksonville, Florida, travelled to towns in the South and Midwest, recruiting local talent to

produce a series of films using the same screenplay. The movie would then be shown in the town's theaters where invariably it was a hit with the locals and a financial success for Norman.

Welcoming Our New Consulting Archaeologist

Following the Fall program, a reception was held at the A.W. Jones Heritage Center to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the Archaeology Lab and to welcome Lindsey Cochran, Ph.D. as our new Consulting Archaeologist. Dr. Cochran first came to St. Simons in 2012 as an assistant for a field school headed by Nick Honerkamp. At the reception, Dr. Honerkamp's valuable role as our Consulting Archaeologist since 2015 was also recognized.

During Dr. Cochran's presentation at the Fall Program, she explained that there are over 62,000 archaeological sites in the state of Georgia. Over 6,000 sites are located on the Georgia coast and barrier islands, and archaeology has been completed on less than 1% of them. Veteran's Day Highlight

On Veteran's Day, the Home Front Museum had a very special visitor. World War II veteran Charles L. Crawley, Jr., of Kennesaw, Georgia, came to the Museum with his family to see how a photograph he donated to the Society in 2010 is featured in our exhibits. The picture shows Crawley in his Georgia State Guard (GSG) uniform at a base in Brunswick. At the age of 15, Crawley joined the GSG so that he could contribute to the war effort. After training as a radio operator in Atlanta, he was assigned to Brunswick, arriving in January 1943. At that time, the GSG was assisting the U.S. Army in keeping watch along the coast for enemy attacks or suspicious activity. The barrier islands were particularly vulnerable. For two-to-three-week periods, Crawley was assigned to Ossabaw, Little Cumberland, and Little St. Simons islands, where he served as a radio operator. In April, the

Coast Guard took over this patrol duty, and Crawley returned to Atlanta. He joined the Navy as soon as he turned 17, the legal age for enlistment.

Crawley donated the photographs of his time here, not knowing they would become part of a museum exhibit eight years later. When his son Lamar visited the Museum earlier this year, he recognized the image of his father. He then started making arrangements to bring his father to the Museum for Veteran's Day. We were excited to welcome four generations of the family, seen here posing in front of the enlarged photo: Charles Crawley (age 96), his son Lamar, his granddaughter Marci Bowler holding his great granddaughter Finley Bowler.
