This year, **Journeys** will explore the cultural history and historic preservation of Savannah, beginning with a field trip on **Tuesday**, **April 18**. The first stop will be a visit to **The Beach Institute African American Cultural Center** and **The King-Tisdell Cottage**. The Beach Institute was built between 1865 and 1867 by free, formerly enslaved people and was the first official school for African Americans in Savannah. The King-Tisdell Cottage was built in 1896 in a Victorian style and is the only African American historic house in Savannah. It became a museum in 1981 through the efforts of W.W. Law, famed Civil Rights leader, historian, and preservation advocate. During a guided tour, our group will explore period rooms, artwork, and exhibits while learning about African American art, history, and cultural preservation in Savannah.

The tour will be followed by lunch at **Belford's**, located in a 1902 building in City Market that was designed by Hyman Witcover, the architect of Savannah's gold-domed City Hall. Belford's is among Savannah's most popular restaurants.

Our mission is to connect people to Coastal Georgia's dynamic history through the stories we share and the collections we preserve. The afternoon includes a stop at the **Isaiah Davenport House Museum**, where the movement to preserve Savannah's historic downtown area began. The museum recently opened a new exhibit presenting the

stories of the enslaved who worked for the Davenport family. The Davenport House staff will share the stories of the enslaved men, women, and children on the property from 1812 – 1828 and how they navigated daily life with the family. The visit will include a multimedia presentation and viewing of the period rooms.

On Thursday, April 27 at 6 p.m., our journey continues with "Savannah's Squares: Reflections on Southern Urban Society," by historian Christopher Hendricks, Ph.D. Dr. Hendricks will discuss how the city's unique geography has shaped the way three centuries of Savannah citizens have lived, worked, played, and interacted with one another. He will also illustrate how Savannah's growth and the accompanying

changes in fashion and lifestyle have been reflected in the city's landscape.



Dr. Hendricks is a professor of history at Georgia Southern University - Armstrong Campus. In addition to teaching courses in American history, he has studied and worked extensively in archaeology, historic preservation, and museum interpretation with such organizations as Colonial Williamsburg, Old Salem, and the Historic Savannah Foundation. He received a B.A. in history from Wake Forest University and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from The College of William and Mary. He is author of *The Backcountry Towns of Colonial Virginia* and *Old Southern Cookery: Mary Randolph's Recipes from America's First Regional Cookbook Adapted for Today's Kitchen*, which he co-wrote with his mother.

admission and guided tours of the museums, lunch, and all transportation. The tour will depart from the A.W. Jones Heritage Center at 8 a.m. and return at approximately 6 p.m. Once purchased, tickets are non-refundable, although they may be transferred to another person.

The **April 27 lecture** will be held in-person and virtually at 6 p.m. at the St. Simons Presbyterian Church. The lecture is free for members and \$10 for non-members.

Community Recognition and Support for Preservation

We are also excited to report that the **Terry Thomas Foundation has awarded a \$30,000 grant** to restore the gazebo on the campus of the St. Simons Lighthouse and that the Sea Island Gardening Group will complete the project by providing \$5,000 for landscaping. The grants will be used to restore and beautify this

structure which once served as the ornamental cover for a water tank at a summer cottage on St. Simons Sound that was built by shipping magnate F. D. M. Strachan around 1910. The gazebo was donated to the Coastal Georgia Historical Society and moved to the lighthouse site in 1989. Since then, it has become an essential part of our school tours where students learn the crucial role of the lighthouse as an aid to navigation. And every summer it serves as the focal point for the Little Light Music Concert Series.

Heritage Trail Milestones



Since the **Georgia World War II Heritage Trail** was launched in February 2021, exciting milestones have been achieved! Trail partners collaborated on several initiatives including the Warbird Tour which featured restored World War II aircraft for public viewing and rides at cities along the Trail. CAF Airbase Georgia, a trail partner based in Peachtree City, sponsored the Tour. A documentary entitled "The Girl Who Wore Freedom" was shown at several of our sites providing statewide access to Georgians. And in December, Chatham County and our partner the Mighty Eighth Museum, won the WWII American Heritage City designation for the state of Georgia.

A planning meeting was held in January at Andersonville National Historic Site, and future marketing goals were established including expanding our website and social media presence, as well as publicizing our joint WWII calendars to become the "go to resource for Georgia's WWII stories and experiences."

Highlights from Cumberland Field Trip

On November 10, members spent a memorable day on Cumberland Island and received a rare glimpse into life there, from the plantation period through present day. After enjoying the glorious weather on the ferry over, the tour began with a visit to the Chimneys, the 19th century architectural remains of enslaved people's dwellings, where National Park Service archaeologist Michael Seibert discussed recently completed preservation work to stabilize the structures. Lunch was served at Stafford House, which is privately owned by a Carnegie descendant who graciously allowed us access to the residence and the Chimneys and shared fascinating family anecdotes. The day concluded with a trip to the ruins of Dungeness, the winter home of Thomas and Lucy Carnegie, and several nearby sites.

Georgia History Day



Oglethorpe Point Elementary School hosted their annual History Day program on Friday, February 10. Julya Lizarralde, the Home Front Museum Director, attended the event and presented a program to fifth grade classes about maritime codes and the history of the Coast Guard during World War II. The students used interactive alphabet blocks to decode a message about the Coasties' duties during the war. Along with decoding, they also learned about the NATO phonetic alphabet and why it is still used in the military today.
