Winter Program Silent Spring Revolution and Its Connection to Coastal Georgia

On Sunday, January 14, 2024, at 4 p.m., Douglas Brinkley, Ph.D., will present the Society's Winter Program. Dr. Brinkley will focus on his latest book, Silent Spring Revolution: John F. Kennedy, Rachel Carson, Lyndon B. Johnson, Richard Nixon, and the Great Environmental Awakening, with an emphasis on Coastal Georgia's role in the story of the environmental movement.

The book chronicles the rise of

environmental activism during the long sixties. It tells the story of an indomitable generation who worked to save the natural world under the leadership of John F. Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson, and Richard Nixon. Doris Kearns Goodwin praised the book as "not only a majestic work of history; it is an urgent call for our time."

Dr. Brinkley is the Katherine Tsanoff Brown Chair in Humanities and Professor of History at Rice University. He serves as the CNN Presidential Historian and as U.S. Presidential Historian for the

Other books by the award-winning author include American Moonshot: John F. Kennedy and the Great Space Race and Cronkite. He received the Robert F. Kennedy Book award for The Great Deluge: Hurricane Katrina,

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
New Orleans, and the Mississippi Gulf Coast, two Grammy Awards for Presidential Suite: Eight Variations on Freedom, and Fandango at the Wall, and he was awarded the Arthur S. Link-Warren F. Kuehl Prize for The Nixon Tapes.

The lecture will be held at the St. Simons Presbyterian Church at 4 p.m., and live streaming will be available. The program is free of charge for CGHS members and \$25 for non-members. Registration is required for both members and non-members at coastalgeorgiahistory.org.

Buddy Sullivan's Local History Course

Buddy Sullivan will present a four-week lecture series, "History of the Golden Isles—and Slightly Beyond," on Tuesday afternoons, January 16, 23, 30 and February 6, from 4 – 5:30 p.m at the A.W. Jones Heritage Center. The winter series will feature St. Simons, Sea Island, Jekyll, Sapelo, Brunswick, and Darien, and will trace chronologically Georgia's coastal history from Native American culture through 20th century events, including World War II.

The cost is \$50 for CGHS members and \$95 for non-members. Registration is required at coastalgeorgiahistory.org.




Timber rafted down the Altamaha River, 1895

Honoring Black History Month with Journeys

On Thursday, February 22, 2024, at 6 p.m., Bernard Powers, Ph.D., will present a program in honor of Black History Month. The lecture is part of the **2024 Journeys** program, which combines a lecture with a field trip. Dr. Powers will discuss African American history in the Lowcountry and will examine ongoing research at the Center for the Study of Slavery at the College of Charleston, including the findings of graduate student Lauren Davila. In 2023, Davila uncovered the largest known U.S. auction of enslaved people, which took place in Charleston in 1835 and involved the sale of 600 people. This sale surpasses the previously acknowledged largest sale of enslaved people in the United States, often known as the Weeping Time, which took place in March 1859. Although this sale was conducted in Savannah, the 436 people sold were brought to the city from Pierce Mease Butler's plantations on St. Simons and Butler islands.

Dr. Powers is Professor Emeritus of History at the College of Charleston, the founding director of the Center for the Study of Slavery, and the lead academic liaison for the College's work with the Universities Studying Slavery consortium. He earned M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in American History at Northwestern University. He is the author of *Black Charlestonians: A Social History 1822 – 1885* and a co-author of *We Are Charleston: Tragedy and Triumph at Mother Emanuel*. Dr. Powers is past president of the South Carolina Historical Association and the Advisory Board of the Avery Research Center for African American History and Culture. Most recently, Dr. Powers served as interim CEO of the recently opened International African American Museum.

The program will be held at the St. Simons Presbyterian Church, at 6 p.m., and live streaming will be available. The lecture is free of charge, but registration is required by visiting coastalgeorgiahistory.org.

The Journeys field trip on **March 5** will explore the lives and legacies of enslaved people in Coastal Georgia, including those involved in the Weeping Time. Our group will first visit the remains of Hampton Plantation, acquired in 1774 by Major Pierce Butler. We will also visit Butler Island, which was operated as a rice plantation by the Butler family. Fanny Kemble, the wife of Major Butler's grandson, Pierce Mease Butler, stayed here in the winter of 1838 – 1839. Kemble was shocked at the treatment of enslaved

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people that she witnessed and later authored a book, *Journal of a Residence on a Georgian Plantation in 1838 - 1839*, about her experiences on St. Simons and Butler islands. The couple divorced in 1849, and in 1859, Pierce Mease Butler sold people enslaved at both plantations during the Weeping Time to save himself from bankruptcy. This history will be explored by speakers at each location who will provide more information about the lives of the enslaved and the impact of events like the Weeping Time in Coastal Georgia.

The field trip to Hampton Plantation and Butler Island includes transportation, guided experiences at both locations, and lunch. The tour will depart from the A.W. Jones Heritage Center. Once purchased, tickets are non-refundable, although they may be transferred to another person. Please look for an email in the **second week of January for registration and field trip details.**

Spring Lecture

On March 21, Leslie Dunlap, Ph.D., will present a lecture on Vara Majette in celebration of Women's History Month. An important figure in Coastal Georgia history, Majette was a pioneering social worker and became one of the first women admitted to the Georgia Bar Association. She moved to St. Simons in 1932 and became fascinated with local history. In later years, she produced a series of watercolors depicting the island's historic landscapes. Dr. Dunlap, Continuing Professor of History at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon, will examine Majette's research on Native American life in Coastal Georgia.
