

"Seasons of Change: Elections That Shaped Our National and State History"

American elections have always been harbingers of change—not just of elected officials, but of policies, attitudes, and how we as a nation conduct elections themselves. Coastal Georgia Historical Society's 2024 Chautauqua Lecture Series will explore changemaking elections that had a significant impact, both in Georgia and for the U.S. Presidency.

On August 8, Scott Buchanan, Ph.D., will deliver a lecture titled, "Georgia's Gubernatorial Election of 1946: The Triumph of Rural Georgia." The elected candidate in 1946, Eugene Talmadge, died before taking the oath of office. Three politicians, including Talmadge's son, Herman, claimed the office, causing three months of tension and uncertainty. Dr. Buchanan is a professor of political science and Department Chair of Government and Sociology at Georgia College and State University.



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The mission of the Society is to connect people to Coastal Georgia's dynamic history through the stories we share and the collections we preserve.

He is the co-author of The Three Governors Controversy: Skullduggery, Machinations, and the Decline of Georgia's Progressive Politics. His previous works include Some of the People Who Ate My Barbecue Didn't Vote for Me: The Life of Georgia Governor Marvin Griffin.

At the program on August 15, Laurence Jurdem, Ph.D., will present "A Parting of the Ways: Theodore Roosevelt, Henry Cabot Lodge and the Presidential Election of 1912." During this controversial contest, Roosevelt launched a third-party bid, in opposition to his own party and incumbent William Taft. Ultimately, this threw the election to Woodrow Wilson. Roosevelt's actions will be examined through the lens of his friendship with political colleague Henry Cabot Lodge, who refused to support Roosevelt's independent bid for a third term. Dr. Jurdem is an Adjunct Professor of History at Fairfield University and Fordham College's Lincoln Center campus. A frequent writer on American politics, his articles have appeared in the New York Times, the Washington Post, and the San Francisco Chronicle. His most recent book is The Rough Rider and the Professor: Theodore Roosevelt, Henry Cabot Lodge, and the Friendship that Changed American History.






The lecture on August 22 will feature award-winning historian Harold Holzer who will deliver "Electing and Re-electing Lincoln: The Immigrant Impact in 1860 and 1864." The program will be based on his new book, Brought Forth on This Continent: Abraham Lincoln and American Immigration, which describes the effect of the influx of foreign born people on the political landscape of an increasingly divided nation. One of the nation's leading authorities on Lincoln, Mr. Holzer serves as the director of Hunter College's Roosevelt House Public Policy Institute and is chairman of the Lincoln Forum. He has written numerous books on Lincoln and has appeared in specials for C-SPAN, PBS, CNN, and other networks. He is a recipient of the National Humanities Medal and the Gilder-Lehrman Lincoln Prize.

Richard Brookhiser, also a National Humanities Medal winner, will present the final program in the series on **September 5**, "1800 – America's First Two-Party System Goes to the **Polls.**" In this third contest for the presidency, Thomas Jefferson and his own vice presidential running mate, Aaron Burr, tied for electoral college votes, and it took 36 ballots for the House of Representatives to elect Jefferson. This election also featured the first peaceful transfer of power to the non-incumbent

party. Mr. Brookhiser, a journalist and biographer, has written extensively about the Early Republic and the Founders, including books on George Washington, James Madison, John Marshall, and Alexander Hamilton. He also wrote and hosted the PBS documentary "Rediscovering George Washington." His latest work is Glorious Lessons: John Trumbull, Painter of the American Revolution.

Celebrating the F.J. Torras Causeway

The Society is excited to partner with the Torras
Foundation to celebrate the centennial of the F. J. Torras
Causeway. On June 26 and July 10, Allison Dupuis,
Director of Public Programming, will present a lecture on
the history of the Torras Causeway. Entitled "Celebrating
100 Years of Connection: Imagining, Building, and
Keeping the F. J. Torras Causeway," the lecture examines
the factors that led to the construction of the road, the
personalities that made it possible, and its social and
economic impact in the decades since its completion.

Lectures will take place at the A.W. Jones Heritage Center at 6 p.m., and the June 26 program will be available via live stream. The programs are free of charge and open to the public. To register, visit coastalgeorgiahistory.org.

Walter Hawthorne and Enslaved.org

On May 9, Walter Hawthorne, Ph.D., presented "Enslaved: Peoples of the Historical Slave Trade" at the A.W. Jones Heritage Center. Dr. Hawthorne is a professor of African and digital history at Michigan State University. He is also the director of Enslaved.org, an online database that is a repository of richly detailed stories of the lives of enslaved people. In his lecture, Dr. Hawthorne described the origins of the Enslaved.org project, its achievements, and its ongoing work and research.

Preserving Our Lighthouse

Over the past month, the St. Simons Lighthouse tower and Fresnel lens mechanism have been inspected to ensure visitor safety and identify any maintenance issues. On April 29, Jude Kostage, Principal of Atlantic Engineering Services in Jacksonville, completed an assessment of the tower, which the Society commissions every three years. Mr. Kostage has 15 years of experience with our Lighthouse. He provided engineering services during the extensive restoration of the tower in 2010.

On May 17, Mike Bennett, Operations Director at Ponce Inlet Lighthouse and Museum, did a detailed inspection of the French-made Fresnel lens mechanism, which consists of a fixed light surrounded by four lens panels that rotate to create the characteristic flash every 60 seconds. Mr. Bennett is a member of the lens restoration team at Ponce Inlet, one of only a few facilities in the country that undertake repair of historic lenses. He was assisted by Ralph Ainger, a member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary team that faithfully maintains the light as a Federal Aid to Navigation.
