As nationwide awareness of the attractions, communities, and natural beauty of Georgia's coast increased in the early twentieth century, visitors flocked to the area—including some of the most well-known figures of their time. Some, like future president

Dwight D. Eisenhower and flying ace Eddie Rickenbacker, came here for vacations. Others, like Zora Neale Hurston and B.B. King, visited Coastal Georgia for their careers. The expansion of tourism transformed the Golden Isles into both a destination and a crossroads. When these trailblazers visited, they brought the spotlight with them.





Michel Paradis, Ph.D.

On *Thursday, September 4*, 2025, Michel Paradis, Ph.D., will deliver a lecture about Dwight D. Eisenhower. In 1946, Eisenhower and his wife Mamie famously vacationed on Sea Island, where an oak planted to honor their visit remains today. Dr. Paradis is a leading human rights lawyer, historian, and national security law scholar. He is most recently the author of the critically acclaimed *The Light of Battle: Eisenhower, D-Day, and the Birth of the American Superpower.* He is also a partner at the international law firm Curtis Mallet-Prevost and a Lecturer at Columbia Law School. He was awarded his doctorate from Oxford University, where he was a Campion Scholar, and received his law degree from Fordham University in New York.

Daniel de Visé will present a program on B.B. King on **September 11.** In 1961, King visited and performed at the Dolphin Club Lounge on Jekyll Island. The Lounge was located near St. Andrews Beach, which was for

a time the only public beach on Georgia's segregated coast accessible to African Americans. The venue was also part of the Chitlin Circuit, a series of venues throughout the South that served Black performers and Black audiences. Daniel de Visé's book *King of the Blues: The Rise and Reign of B.B. King* was a *Kirkus* Best Nonfiction Book of the Year and was longlisted for the PEN America Award for Biography. His journalistic work has appeared in the *Washington Post, USA Today*, and the *Miami Herald*. In 2001, he won a shared Pulitzer Prize with his team at the *Herald*. De Visé received his bachelor's degree from Wesleyan University and his master's in journalism from Northwestern University.



The program on *September 18* will feature Jennifer L. Freeman Marshall, Ph.D., who will focus on Zora Neale Hurston. Hurston visited St. Simons Island in 1935 alongside researchers from the Library of Congress and New York University. Together, the group conducted interviews with residents of the island's African American






neighborhoods and recorded their traditional music. Dr. Marshall's book Ain't I An Anthropologist: Zora Neale Hurston Beyond the Literary Icon expands on this element of Hurston's career by examining the cultural meanings of Hurston's iconic popularity in literary studies and redefining her contributions to the discipline of anthropology. An Atlanta native and graduate of Spelman College, Dr. Marshall received her M.A. in anthropology from Georgia State University and her Ph.D. in women's studies from Emory University. She is an associate professor in the Department of English and the School of Interdisciplinary Studies at Purdue University.

The series will conclude on **September 25** with a lecture by John F. Ross on Eddie Rickenbacker, a frequent and noted visitor to Sea Island. An early automobile racer, Rickenbacker trained as a pilot in France and became the United States' most decorated flying ace of World War I, a Medal of Honor recipient, and the head of Eastern Air Lines. Ross's book **Enduring Courage: Ace Pilot Eddie Rickenbacker and the Dawn of the Age of Speed** illuminates Rickenbacker's connections to the dawn of car racing, aerial warfare, and the roles of race car drivers and flying aces—and Rickenbacker himself—as American legends. Ross is the former editor of the magazine *American Heritage of Invention*

and Technology and the recipient of the 2011 Fort Ticonderoga Award for Contributions to American History.

The programs in this year's Chautauqua series will take place on Thursday evenings, September 4, 11, 18, and 25, at 6 p.m. at St. Simons Presbyterian Church. Each will be recorded and will be available for viewing after the program. 
Programming Survey Results








Gazebo Restoration

Since March 2023, CGHS has been restoring the historic gazebo using generous grant funds provided by the Terry Thomas Foundation. The gazebo originally functioned as an ornamental cover at the summer cottage built by shipping magnate F.D.M. Strachan on St. Simons Sound around 1910. It was redesigned as a gazebo in 1976. To save it from destruction during residential development of the area in the late 1980s, the gazebo was donated to CGHS and moved to the Lighthouse grounds, where it has become a cherished part of our campus. Time has since taken its toll, however, necessitating a full restoration of the gazebo, which the Terry Thomas Foundation generously provided to ensure the continued use of this open-air structure. After repairing rotten wood, replacing the cypress roof, hand painting the entire structure, and landscaping the area, the gazebo is now ready to welcome students, visitors, and the community.

Historic Preservation

The Lighthouse and Keeper's Dwelling are rejuvenated after the completion of exterior maintenance projects in March. Razorback LLC prepared and painted the Lighthouse observation deck and handrail, as well as the lantern room deck and exterior handrail, in addition to washing, repairing, and painting the exterior masonry. Coastal Coverage Painting & Design Inc. painted the Keeper's Dwelling porch and benches, windows, shutters, soffits, and corbels. This type of work is made possible through the Preservation Fund, which ensures that our historic structures are protected for future generations. Making History

During the spring, more than two dozen school tours brought hundreds of local students to the Lighthouse Museum and Home Front Museum to learn about Coastal Georgia history. Researchers utilized our collections for publications and history graduate courses.

We acquired several new pieces of Coastal Georgia history, including a first edition copy of Fanny Kemble's *Journal of a Residence on a Georgian Plantation in* 1838-1839 (New York: Harper & Brothers, 1863). Kemble is discussed in the Keeper's Dwelling first-floor exhibit, and her book is one of the most well-known publications from 19th-century Coastal Georgia. This acquisition was especially exciting as it includes an inscription of who first purchased it, where, and when.

CGHS staff have also been making history over the past several months in our community and beyond. At Glynn County Schools' 2025 STEAMfest and Literacy Fair, Allison and volunteer Tom Luckstone introduced Glynn County students and parents to the World War II Home Front Museum through the museum's knot table, code blocks, and interactive demonstrations of Morse code and flag semaphore. Allison also gave several presentations, including at Community Church St. Simons, Mosaic Jekyll Island Museum, and Bike Walk Golden Isles. Aaron has been busy with artifact conservation work for the Florida Museum, which he presented at the Florida Anthropological Society conference. He's also met with landowners to discuss cultural resources on their property, including potential archaeology work. Whitney led a roundtable on Public Humanities in the South at the Southeastern American Studies Association conference. She also met virtually with architecture students at the University of Texas at Austin to discuss historic preservation.
