

Winter Program:

Creating a New Nation: President George Washington and the Southern Tour

On Sunday, January 25, 2026, at 4 p.m., Lindsay M. Chervinsky, Ph.D., will begin the Coastal Georgia Historical Society's year-long celebration of the Semiquincentennial—or 250th—anniversary of the founding of the United States. Dr. Chervinsky will show how George Washington used presidential tours to bring the new federal government to the American people, forge bonds between citizens and the Constitution, and build trust in the presidency. These tours included multiple stops in Georgia featuring meetings with local leaders, tours of Revolutionary War ruins, and extensive

public celebrations to commemorate Washington's arrival. As the nation celebrates its 250th birthday, Dr. Chervinsky will explore why 1776 was just the beginning of the founding of the nation.

Dr. Lindsay M. Chervinsky is a presidential historian and Executive Director of the George Washington Presidential Library at Mount Vernon. She is the author of the

award-winning books Making the Presidency: John Adams and the Precedents that Forged the Republic and The Cabinet: George Washington and the Creation of an American Institution, and co-editor of Mourning the Presidents: Loss and Legacy in American Culture. Dr. Chervinsky regularly writes for public audiences in publications like the Washington Post, TIME, USA Today, CNN, and the Wall Street Journal and provides commentary and historical context for outlets like CBS News, C-SPAN, Face the Nation, the New York Times, and NPR.

The 2026 Winter Program will take place at St. Simons Presbyterian Church at 4 p.m. Livestreaming will be available. The program is free of charge for CGHS members and \$25 for non-members. Registration is required for both members and non-members at coastalgeorgiahistory.org.



Join the Coastal Georgia Historical Society as we celebrate the nation's 250th birthday! Revolution on the Coast: A 250th Celebration is a week-long Semiquincentennial festival for our community to explore and experience the history of the American Revolution. From March 9 through March 15, 2026, CGHS and our community partners will present a series of engaging programming—including lectures, performances, movie screenings, and more—at venues throughout the area. RC250's main event is the First Oval Office Project of the Museum of the American Revolution, which will bring a replica of General George Washington's Revolutionary War tent—the mobile command center of the Continental Army—to Gascoigne Bluff Park for the festival weekend. The project also includes several other tents, like common soldiers' tents and a dining tent, along with costumed interpreters who will reveal the different experiences of those who served and sacrificed during the Revolutionary War. This will be the first time this special exhibit has visited the state of Georgia, providing a wonderful opportunity

for our state's citizens to interact with the important history of the American Revolution. RC250 is free and open to the public on Saturday and Sunday; Friday is reserved for school tours by local students. Weekday festival programming will be priced per event. All offerings will require registration. To learn more, visit coastalgeorgiahistory.org/RC250.


Buddy Sullivan Winter Lecture Series 2026



Buddy Sullivan will present a four-week lecture series. "History of the Golden Isles – and Slightly Beyond," on Tuesday afternoons, January 20 and 27 and February 3 and 10, 2026, from 3-4:30 p.m. at the A.W. Jones Heritage **Center.** The winter series will feature St. Simons. Sea Island, Jekyll, Sapelo, Brunswick, and Darien, and will chronologically trace Georgia's coastal history from Indigenous habitation of the islands through the era of World War II.

Sidney Lanier Bridge, ca. 1958.


This popular series has been conducted by Buddy Sullivan each year since 1995. In addition to his position as the Society's Consulting Historian, Sullivan is the author of 20 books about Georgia history, with a focus on his home region of Coastal Georgia. His recently published titles include *Georgia: A State History* and *Sapelo: People and Place on a Georgia Sea Island*. He served as Director of the Sapelo Island National Estuarine Research Reserve from 1993 to 2013, and in 2005, he received the Governor's Medal in the Humanities from the Georgia Humanities Council in recognition of his literary and cultural contributions to the state. **The cost for the series is \$50 for CGHS members and \$95 for non-members. HISTORY IS HAPPENING

In partnership with the Cassina Garden Club, Dr. Aaron Ellrich, CGHS Archaeologist, recently led an excavation at Hamilton Plantation on Gascoigne Bluff as part of the Club's "Dig a Little Deeper" program. He also spent time in southwest Georgia collaborating with Dr. Dennis Blanton of James Madison University and a team of researchers investigating early Spanish colonial encounters. Their work continues to shed new light on Hernando de Soto's 1540 expedition through Georgia.

In addition, Dr. Ellrich has been working with the Florida Museum of Natural History to transfer St. Simons Island archaeological collections to the Society. This effort supports one of the key objectives outlined in the Society's 2025—2030 Strategic Plan and strengthens our commitment to preserving and interpreting Georgia's coastal heritage.

Dr. Whitney Nell Stewart, the Society's Executive Director, presented at the annual meetings of the American Association of State & Local History and the Southern Historical Association. She was also interviewed by *News4Jax* about the history—and contentious origins—of Brunswick

stew. Allison Dupuis, CGHS Historian, appeared on *News4Jax*'s segment about the St. Simons Lighthouse Museum. In January, she will deliver a presentation for the City of Roswell, near Atlanta, about several prominent Roswell families' origins in Coastal Georgia.

Recently, the American flag halyard broke at the Home Front Museum. With the help of Lieutenant Currier, Lieutenant Weekley, Fire Fighter Rowell, Fire Fighter Davis from Glynn County Fire Rescue, Officer Wooten from the Glynn County Police Department, and our United States Coast Guard Auxiliary members Jeff Cole and Ted Madaj, we were able to re-rig the upper most halyard. The American flag, Coast Guard flag, and Georgia flag are all flying high and although there is construction at East Beach, the World War II Home Front Museum is open during this time!

Hoisting the Colors at the Historic Coast Guard Station

The Historic St. Simons Coast Guard Station, built as part of a series of New Deal projects across the country, had its "First Watch" and commissioning ceremony on April 1, 1937. Among the structures on the Station's complex was a flagpole. This original element of the Coast Guard Station's design still stands—and performs its function—today.

The tallest part of the pole houses a halyard, or rope mechanism, for the American flag. As part of their daily duties, station personnel hoisted the American flag at 0800 and performed evening colors at 1700. The original 60-foot flagpole at the St. Simons Coast Guard Station also includes lines for signal flags, smaller flags with bright patterns that represent the International Code of Signals. These signal flags could be strung together to communicate messages to offshore vessels.
